This is the fourth and last issue of the newsletter from the FW 6 project Co-ordination Action on Human Rights Violations (CAHRV) aiming at a broader audience. It is distributed to the European Network on Conflict, Gender and Violence.

THE FRAMEWORK 6 PROJECT IS COMING TO AN END: April 2007 is the last month of our funding from in the 6th FP, but by no means the end of the CAHRV network! Many of our members have discovered new ideas, new connections and colleagues for collaboration, and a number of smaller networks and projects have emerged, some being funded in other programs. University of Osnabrück will continue to maintain the homepage www.cahrv.uni-osnabrueck.de and there are plans for a follow-up project in Framework 7 where our work can be expanded and targeted more directly to stakeholders and decision-makers as well as to the interdisciplinary and inter-professional “community” of research and practice. This future work is planned as a coordination action to promote dissemination, and to increase awareness of the deep connection between overcoming gender-based violence and achieving full gender equality. It will be organized as a network of cooperation projects that share the CAHRV goal of an integrated perspective on interpersonal violence and human rights.
